AFMAの第15回大会は、同志社大学一神教学際研究センター（CISMOR）との共催で、2024年12月7日（土曜日）と8日（日曜日）に、同志社大学今出川校地で開催されます。7日は午後に基調講演“Towards an Optimal Framework for Middle East Studies: Asian and Middle Eastern Perspectives in an Era of Global Challenges”を会場とオンライン配信のハイブリッドで行い、8日は終日会場で個人研究発表、企画パネルおよびAFMA参加学会の来賓による発表を行います。

ありがたいことに、個人研究発表40件と12の企画パネル、および8件の来賓による講演が、10会場15部会に分かれて進行するという、大規模な国際学会となる予定です。それに相応しく、多くの方々に聞いていただき、質疑を盛り上げていただきたいと思っておりますので、会員の皆様のふるってのご参加をお願い申し上げます。また、今回のAFMAは、基調講演と研究発表・パネルともに、完全に公開としますので、会員以外の方々もご来聴いただけます。

On December 7, the keynote session “Towards an Optimal Framework for Middle East Studies: Asian and Middle Eastern Perspectives in an Era of Global Challenges” will be held in a hybrid format (in-person and online). On December 8, individual presentations, pre-organized panels, and presentations by guests from AFMA’s member associations will be held at the venue in an in-person format only.

This year’s AFMA conference will be open to the public throughout, and all interested parties are welcome to attend. Please register via the URL or QR code provided below. The registration deadline is December 1. While there is no registration fee for the conference, a fee of 7,000 JPY is
